Thank you to everyone for all the hard work over 2024 and a special thank you to those of you who will continue to work over the holiday period to keep our hospital services operating.


I hope you all have an opportunity to get some rest and recuperation over the holiday period.

As I walk around the hospital I have been amazed at the creativity and colour of the Christmas Ward Decorations with the theme of Unity.

I think the effort staff have put in to the decorations exemplifies the team spirit we continue to share at Lakes.

Our team spirit and commitment

to the health of our communities also shows in our results this year. Despite the challenges of demand, our hospitals continue to perform well across the



health targets and we have made some really good progress.

In particular, we are leading the country with the proportion of people who wait less than four months for a First Specialist Assessment from date of referral (97.4% for period 1 July to 30 September).

We have made good improvements over the last six months in getting more people through ED within the target timeframe – yesterday we achieved 90% of our patients being admitted or discharged in six hours in Rotorua – top the country!

Our goal is to achieve 95% - we are

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nearly there. The strong focus on processes, has meant the ongoing improving of results.

Of course we can always do better and I look forward to the coming year as we work together to continue to put processes in place to improve our results.

We have some exciting new staff appointments to celebrate for next year including; a fully staffed medical registrar contingent, a number of physicians joining our team, a full complement of psychiatric registrars (we

haven't had so many before), a record number of new nurse graduates, low nurse and allied health vacancies, and several new dental therapists joining the community oral health service team.

This is a great start for the year as we continue to provide compassionate and high quality health services we can be really proud of for our patients.

Thank you again for everything you do – your efforts and commitment are highly appreciated.

Trevor receives Minister of Health Volunteer award

Seven outstanding individuals and organisations have been recognised in the 2024 Minister of Health Volunteer Awards.

One of them is Lake's-own, Trevor Johns (pictured, centre) who has been a volunteer on Rotorua Hospital help desk since it was first set up, 10 years ago.

Trevor has received the Long Service Award for his work with Hato Hone St John as a volunteer driver.

Minister of Health Dr Shane Reti has acknowledged all winners, as well as other volunteers across New Zealand.

"Since 2013, the Minister of Health Volunteer Awards have given us an opportunity to celebrate and acknowledge our incredible health volunteers.

"Across the country, thousands of New



Zealanders support others in their communities through volunteering. Patients, staff and the whole health system benefit from their efforts."

The 2024 Minister of Health Volunteer Award categories are Health Care Provider Service, Community/NGO Health, Māori Health Service, Pacific Health Service, Youth Health Volunteer, Long Service, and Mental Health and Addiction Service.

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Highlights of 2024

- The Waiariki Mana Ake team welcomed 11 new team members to the Lakes' rohe. The team officially commenced service implementation in February 2024.
- The completely refurbished Perinatal Unit was blessed on 23 January before patients moved in the next day.
- Rotorua Hospital help desk volunteer Trevor Johns celebrated his 90th birthday in February.



- New Lead Chaplain for Rotorua Hospital, Reverend Paul Leighton, started at Rotorua Hospital in February.
- Three new voluntary chaplaincy assistants were commissioned in a service at the Rotorua Hospital Chapel.
- The MHSOP (Mental Health Services for Older People) team returned to their refurbished 1930s' villa having been re-located to 2 Ranolf Street two years ago.
 The Outpatient's Department booking team vacated leased offices in Biak Street and made a welcome return to the hospital moving into 2 Ranolf Street.
- The last vestiges of coal fired energy were removed at Taupō Hospital. This used 300 tonnes of Huntly pea coal every year.
- Rotorua Hospital replaced its old CT scanner for a new state of the art CT scanner.
- Te Toki Haumanu started. It's a new mental health service framework which adds cultural and peer support workers to community and home based mental health teams.
- Consultant radiologist Barbara Hochstein was appointed a Member of the New Zealand Order of Merit for services to radiology and education in the King's Birthday Honours.
- Staff in Rotorua Hospital celebrated Matariki in June with a shared lunch hosted by Te Aka Matua.
- START launched at Lakes in Rotorua in June and Taupō in September. START provides an Early Supported Discharge programme and the community based Non-Acute Rehabilitation Programme (NARP) which is community-based.
- In July, forty-six staff members were recognised for their long service in ceremonies at Rotorua and Taupō Hospitals. Three were recognised for 40 years' service.

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Highlights of 2024

- Three Taupō nurses completed Masters degrees.
- Rotorua Hospital staff celebrated Filipino Language
 Month with a feast and cultural performances in August provided by the Rotorua Hospital Filipino community.
- Nurses in Rotorua Hospital's Medical Unit and Whare Whakaue Mental Health Inpatient Unit celebrated Onam. Onam is an annual harvest and Hindu cultural festival celebrated mostly by the people of Kerala.
- A special morning tea at Rotorua Hospital was held for migrant staff
- Lakes received an exceptionally positive surveillance audit report in September with auditors saying the number of findings identified were the lowest number the audit team had seen in any hospital in the last year.



- Local artist Donovan Bixley shared his artistic skills with Rotorua Hospital patients. The finished art works were displayed in the refubished children's unit.
- The completely refurbished Children's Unit at Rotorua Hospital was officially opened on Tuesday 1 September with Health Minister Dr Shane Reti joining Dr Steve Bradley and long-stay patient Leah-May Elliott, 14 in cutting the ribbon.
- More than 100 nominations were received for the inaugural Allied Health, Scientific and Technical Professionals Awards, which were presented to coincide with their annual day of recognition.
- Lakes is part of a significant research project, Te Kete Rongomau, "Enabling supported decision-making: mental health advance preference statements" a 36-month project which has been awarded \$1,399,977 by the Health Research Council.
- Lakes house officer Dr Fatima Hakak was awarded the 2024 New Zealand Intern
 of the Year-recognition from the New Zealand Medical Council. The winner is
 nominated for the Australasian Intern of the Year.
- The BadgerNet maternity solution went live in in Taupō on 11 November and in Rotorua on 26 November.
- Lakes Obstetrics and Gynaecology Consultant Dr Ruth Swarbrick was awarded the Royal Australia and New Zealand College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists (RANZCOG) Excellence in Women's Health Award in recognition of her significant contributions to Women's Health.
- A \$1M upgrade of geothermal production bores began in December.
- There were 10 entries from Rotorua and two from Taupō in this year's Christmas
 Ward Decorating Competition. This winner of the Board Cup was the Children's
 Unit at Rotorua Hospital, in second place, winning the Friends of Rotorua Hospital
 Cup was the Special Care Baby Unit. In third place was Corporate Services, for its
 inclusivity of children.
- Construction of the new mental health inpatient unit on Rangiuru St. is going well and is due to open next year.

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Hospital wards unified for Christmas deocorating competition

The 2024 cohort of the NETP and NESP programmes were celebrated recently with a graduation ceremony among colleagues, family and friends.

There were 19 who completed this year's Nurse Entry to Practice programme (NETP) and four in the Nurse Entry to Specialist Practice. They were celebrated at a graduation ceremony with highlights of their year.

"We're so proud of all of you," said Janice Hansen, Clinical Nurse Educator (PDU).

"In your first few weeks you were mostly quite shy and reserved but look at you now. It's fantastic to see your confidence in so many skills. Nurses are the people who can make a difference for all our patients."

The programme enables its participants to focus on integrating into the nursing profession from a student to a Registered Nurse. They are offered new clinical experiences in a supportive environment to help grow confidence, knowledge, skills, and career as well as a day out of their unit.

As well as the clinical nurse educators the nurses have also learned from preceptors – other nurses – on the floor. There were 36 preceptors this year and they were also acknowl-



edged.
