Full recruitment for surgical

Service Manager, Surgical Services, Greg Vandergoot

I am pleased to be able to say that overall surgical services is doing really well. There's always room for improvement, but we have much to celebrate.

We welcomed Consultant General Surgeon, Neha Awasthi to the team this month and I am excited to say we are now fully recruited with general surgeons for the first time in several years.

January also saw the arrival of Consultant Orthopaedic Surgeon, Earle Savage and in early June we will be joined by Consultant Orthopaedic Surgeon Vincent Chan which will see the service fully recruited.

It's been a long road, but achieving full recruitment is extremely positive especially because



many of our colleagues in other districts still have major vacancies. We are not there yet with anaesthetics, which is an area we need to focus on. We are holding our own due to the ongoing support extended by the department as we actively recruit to our vacancies.

It's great to now have three women in general surgery and the perspective they bring to the workforce and our patients.

The service has been focused on reducing the number of patients waiting over 365 days for surgery. Nationally we were expected

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to achieve no one waiting over 365 days in all specialities by 30 December 2023 and orthopaedics by 30 June 2024. Thanks to the huge efforts by the planned care team the number of long wait patients has significantly reduced.

Two registered nurses who have been training as registered nurse anaesthetic assistants (RNAA) will complete their training in October


of this year, and two more nurses are about to start the training.

With the national shortage of the anaesthetic technician workforce, this is a way to address vacancies, support the current workforce and aid in maintaining service provision.

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State of art CT scanner ready for patients next week


Rotorua Hospital now has a new state of the art CT scanner that will be much faster, allowing more patients to be scanned, and produce consistently very high quality images.

Radiologist and Head of Radiology Department Mark Barnes says CT scanners are the cornerstone of modern diagnostic imaging.

A CT scan is used to diagnose disease or injury as well as to plan medical, surgical or radiation treatment, he says.

"This scanner is one of the best available at the moment. We have taken care to select the scanner which best provides for the needs of our local population.

"It will allow better images of complex areas such as the heart. To do a good scan of the heart the scanner needs to spin so quickly



that it captures the heart between beats. This scanner does one rotation in .23 of a second compared with .4 seconds for the old scanner."

Planning for the new scanner began in November 2022. This has included the refurbishment of the CT room, and the installation of a new air conditioning system.

Te Toki Haumanu is the name of a new service framework which adds cultural and peer support workers to community and home based mental health teams.

Within the Te Toki Haumanu framework, Poutokomanawa (Cultural Leader) Hubertus (Herbie) Langendoen will provide guidance, training and support to a new Pou Toko Ora (Cultural and Peer Support Worker) workforce. Herbie says Pou Toko Ora are complimentary to clinical work and essential to continuity of care. Where the clinical interventions focus mainly on reducing distressing symptoms, Māori models of care applied by cultural support workers focus on increasing quality of life, e.g. reconnecting with whānau or whenua, exploring whakapapa and engaging in activities that bring meaning.
